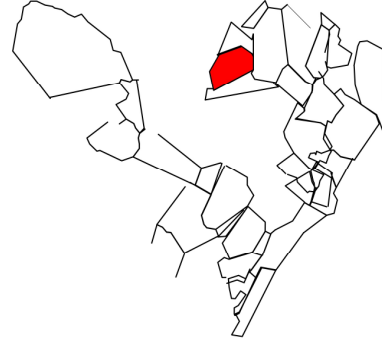

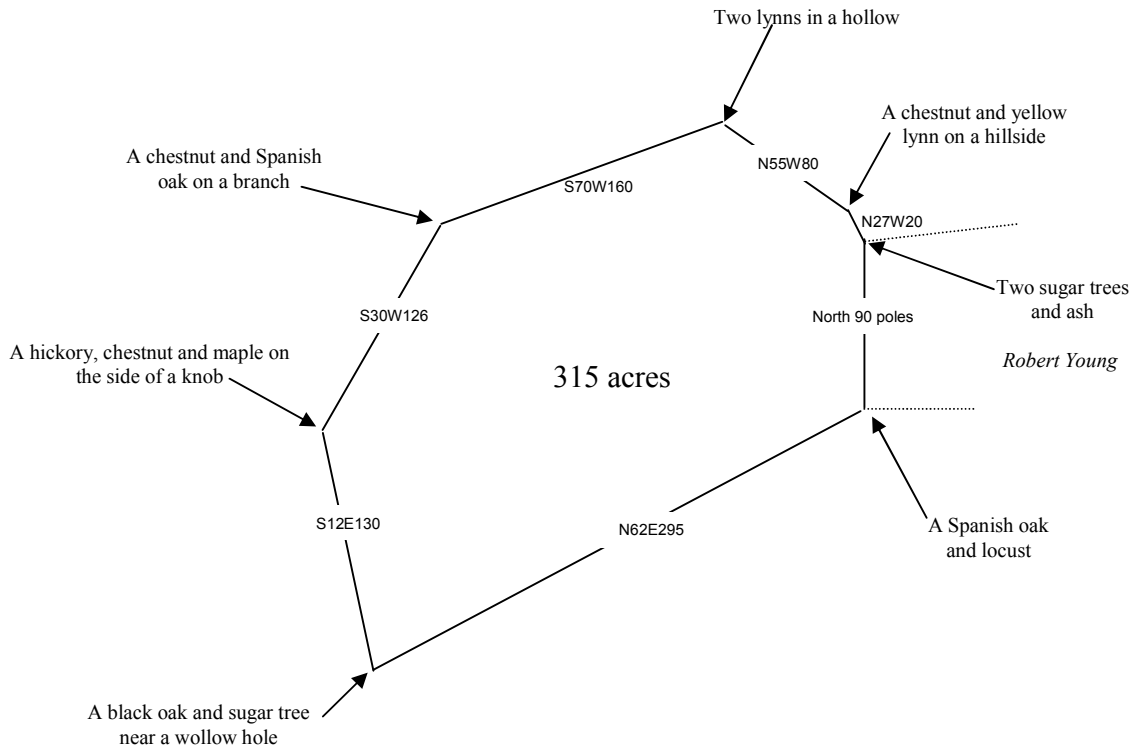

Description

315 acres in Greenbrier County on Sinking Creek
joining a survey made for Robert Young



corner to the land of John's body, thence with the lines of the same, South fifty degrees West thirty nine poles to two black oaks and a white oak, and North seventy nine and a half degrees West one hundred and seventy four poles to the beginning with its appurtenances To have and to hold the said tract or parcel of land with its appurtenances to the said Giles Reynolds and his heirs forever. In Witness whereof the said James Monroe Esquire Governor of the Commonwealth of Virginia hath hereunto set his hand and caused the lesser seal of the said Commonwealth to be affixed at Richmond, on the twenty seventh day of January in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and of the Commonwealth the twenty fourth

Manant. lumber over thousand and twenty one, passed the twenty

fifth of December Seventeen hundred and ninety four, there

is granted by the said Commonwealth unto James McGay a

certain tract or parcel of land containing three hundred and

fifteen acres by survey bearing date the seventh day of January

one thousand seven hundred and ninety five lying and being

in the County of Greenbrier, on Linking Creek, being a Survey

made for Robert Young and bounded as followeth to wit, beginning

at a spanish oak and locust, corner to Young and with north

ninety poles to two Sugar trees, and ash, and leaving north twenty

degrees West twenty poles to a chestnut and Yellow lynn, on a hill side, and

South

North fifty five degrees West Eighty poles, to two lines, in a hollow
 and South seventy degrees West one hundred and sixty poles, to a chestnut
 and spanish oak, on a branch, and South thirty degrees West one
 hundred and twenty six poles, to a hickory, chestnut and maple, on the
 side of a knob, and South twelve degrees East one hundred and
 thirty poles to a black oak and sugar tree near a hollow hole
 and North Sixty two degrees East two hundred and ninety five poles
 to the beginning with its appurtenances to have and to hold the
 said tract or parcel of land with its appurtenances to the said
 James McCay and his heirs forever, In Witness whereof the said James
 Monroe Esquire Governor of the Commonwealth of Virginia hath
 hereunto set his hand and caused the paper seal of the said Common-
 wealth to be affixed at Richmond, on the twenty seventh day of

 eleven thousand two hundred and sixty two, issued the sixth of
 March one thousand seven hundred and eighty two, there is granted
 by the said Commonwealth unto William W. Blung a certain tract
 or parcel of land containing two hundred and thirty acres by
 Survey bearing date the fifteenth day of March one thousand seven
 hundred and ninety six, lying and being in the County of Greenbrier
 on branches of Otter Creek a branch of the Meadow River, including
 a place known by the name of the Slab camp and bounded as
 followeth
