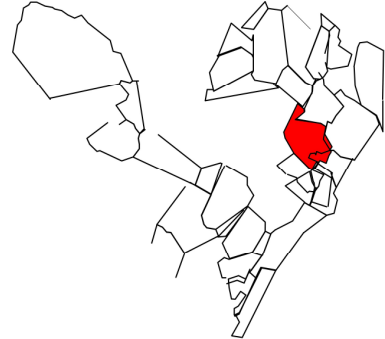


# John Patten – 452 acres in Greenbrier County TN

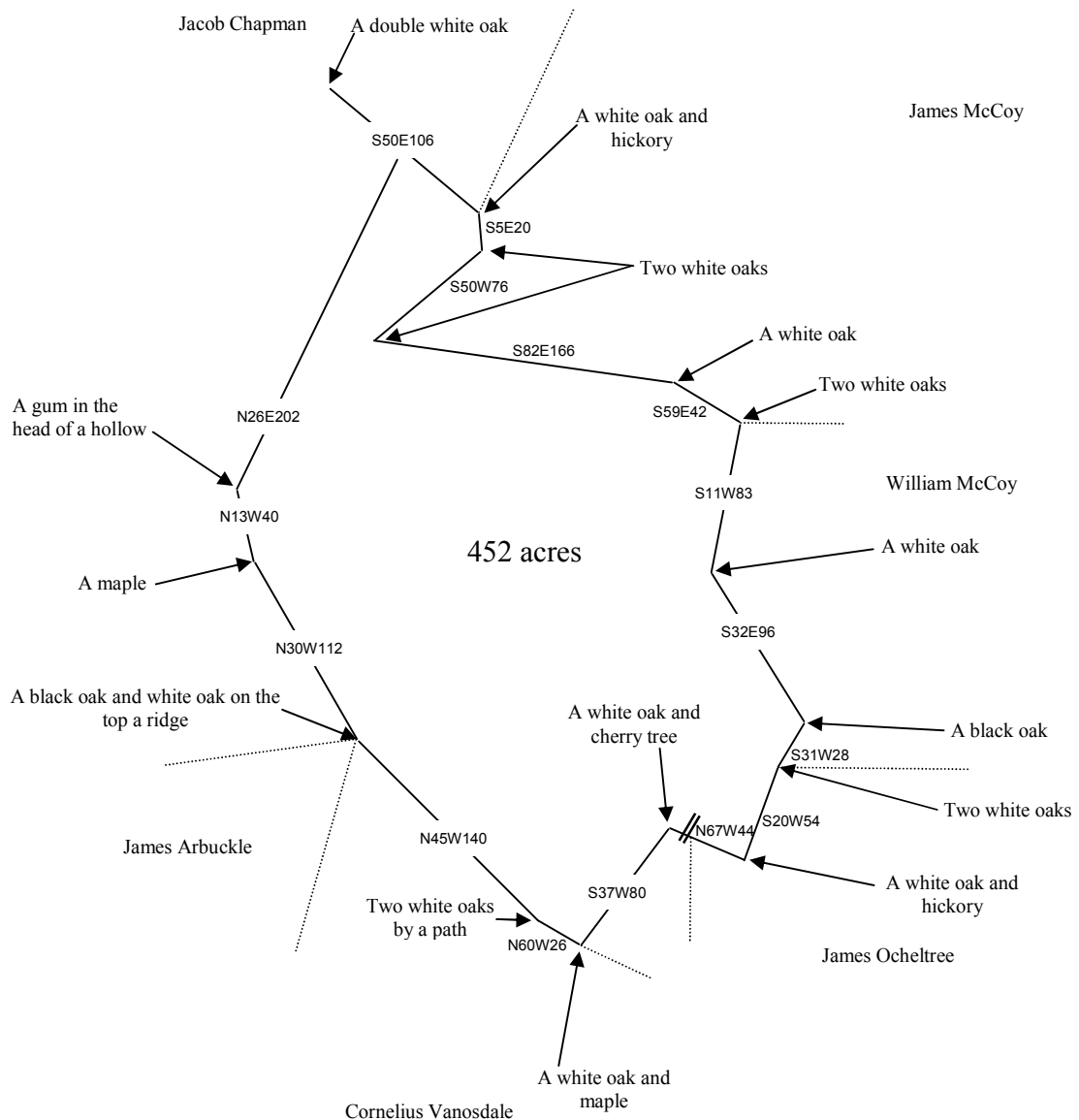
## History

- June 29, 1787 Patent issued, granting 252 acres  
Warrant number 12952 issued, covering 150 acres
- February 22, 1796 Warrant number 1808 issued, covering 50 acres
- October 12, 1796 Date of Inclusive Survey made pursuant to an order of the worshipful court of Greenbrier County  
Survey made for James Arbuckle
- January 30, 1800 Patent signed by James Monroe, Esq., Governor of Virginia

452 acres in Greenbrier County on Sinking Creek joining the lands of Jacob Chapman, James McCoy, William McCoy, deceased, James Ocheltree and Cornelius Vanosdale

James Monroe Esquire Governor of the Commonwealth  
of Virginia. To all to whom these presents shall come, Greeting  
Know ye, that by Virtue of an Inclusive Survey bearing date <sup>the</sup> twelfth  
day of October One thousand Seven hundred and Ninety six pursuant  
to an Order of the Worshipful Court of Greenbrier County there is  
granted by the said Commonwealth unto John Patton a certain tract  
or parcel of land containing four hundred and fifty two acres, two  
hundred and fifty two acres a part thereof was formerly granted to  
said Patton by a patent bearing date the twenty ninth day of June  
One thousand Seven hundred and eighty seven and two hundred  
acres the residue is taken by Virtue of the following Land Office  
Survey Warrants (to wit) One hundred and fifty Acres by Number  
twelve thousand Nine hundred and forty two & fifty Acres by  
Number One thousand Eight hundred and eight. Given the twenty second  
day of February One thousand seven hundred and Ninety six the whole  
lying and being in the County of Greenbrier on Sinking Creek joining  
the land of Jacob Kelpman James M. Coy William M. Coy  
deceased James Holtz and Charles Mansdale and a Survey  
made for James Abchurch and bounded as follows (to wit)  
Beginning at a double white Oak on Kelpmans Old line  
thence South fifty degrees East One hundred and six poles to a  
white Oak and thence corner to said Kelpman & James M.  
Coy and with the latter South five degrees East twenty poles  
to two white Oaks South fifty degrees West seventy six poles  
Crossing a Run to two white Oaks corner to his old Survey & with  
South eighty two degrees East One hundred and sixty six poles  
to a white Oak South fifty nine degrees East forty two poles  
to two white Oaks corner to said J. William M. Coy and

with the latter South Eleven degrees West eighty three poles to white Oak  
 South thirty two degrees East Ninety six poles to a black Oak South thirty  
 One degrees West twenty eight poles to two white Oaks corner to said  
 Coy and James Cheltree and with the latter South seventy degrees west  
 fifty four poles to white Oak and hickory North sixty seven degrees West  
 forty four poles passing Cheltrees corner white Oak and hickory at thirty four  
 poles and crossing the creek at thirty six poles to a white Oak and Cherry tree  
 and here Patent line South thirty seven degrees West Eighty poles to white  
 Oak and Maple on Nanndales line, and with North sixty degrees West twenty  
 six poles to two white Oaks by a path North forty five degrees West one hundred  
 and forty poles to a black Oak and white Oak on the top of a ridge corner to said  
 Nanndale and James Sibuchile and leave both North thirty degrees West  
 One hundred and twelve poles to maple North thirteen degrees West  
 forty poles to a gum in the heart of a hollow and thence North twenty six  
 degrees East Two hundred and two poles to the Beginning, With its  
 appurtenances, To have and To hold the said Tract or Parcel of Land  
 With its appurtenances To the said John Patton His Heirs forever  
 In Witness Whereof the said James Monroe Esquire Governor of the  
 Commonwealth of Virginia, hath hereunto set his hand & caused the  
 lesser seal of the said Commonwealth to be affixed at Richmond on the  
 thirtieth day of January, In the year of our Lord One thousand Eight  
 hundred & of the Commonwealth the Twenty fourth.

 of part of a Lord Office Treasury Warrant Number, ten thousand seven hundred
