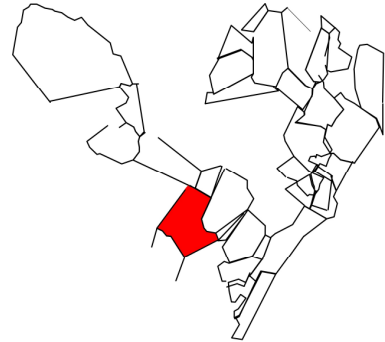


Robert Young – 455 acres in Greenbrier County

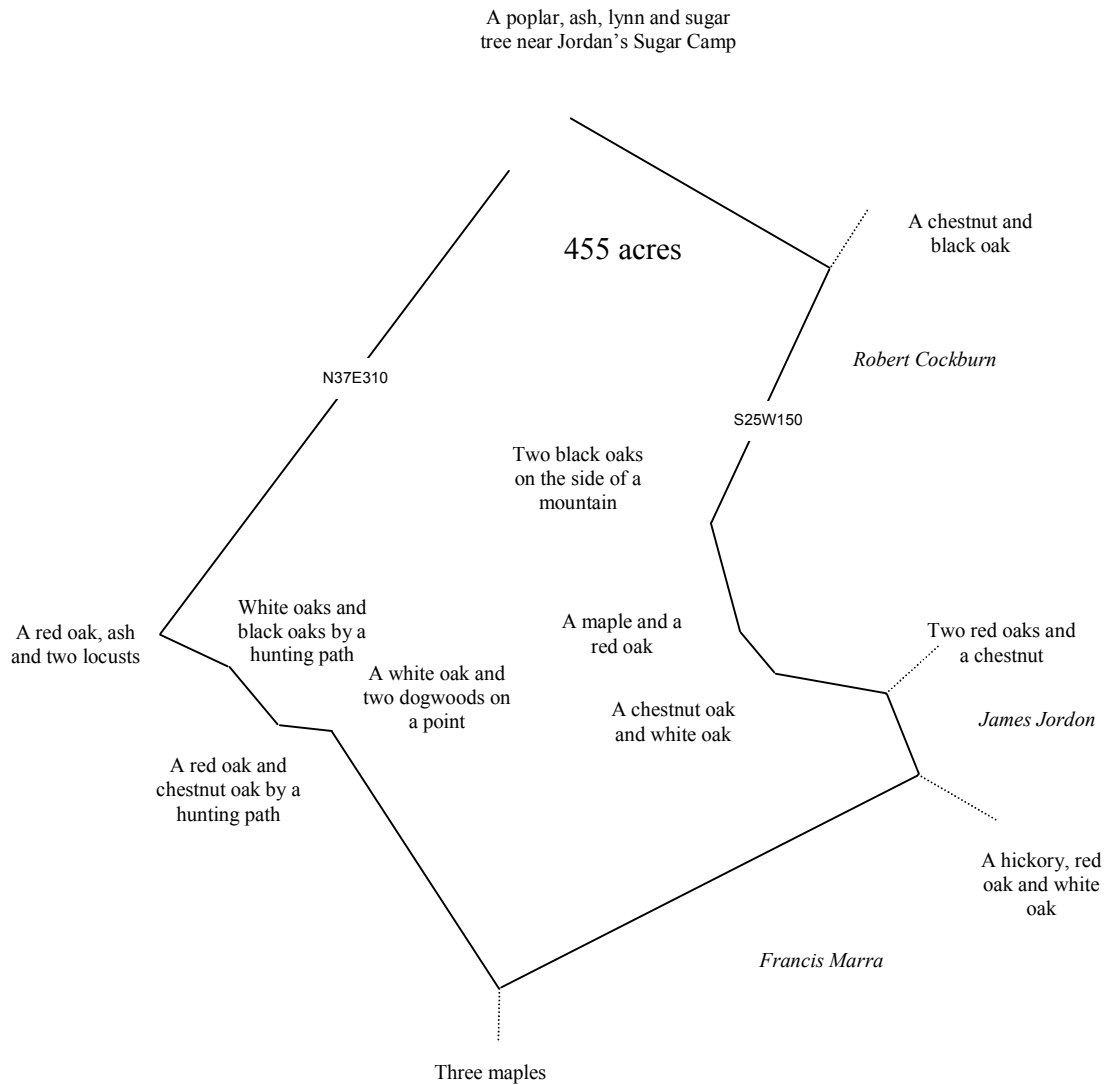
History

November 22, 1793 Warrant number 12227 issued

 February 19, 1796 Patented by Robert Brooke, Esq.,
 Governor of Virginia



Description

455 acres in Greenbrier County joining the lands of
 Cockburn, James Jordon, Francis Marr deceased and
 a survey made for said Young of three hundred acres



said Commonwealth unto Robert Young a certain tract or parcel of Lands containing two hundred Acres by Survey bearing date the eighth day of November One thousand seven hundred and ninety three, lying and being in the County of Greenbrier on the North side of the Laurel Creek at the foot of Gauley Mountain near the mouth of said Creek and about one Mile below where the great Kenhawa road goes up said Mountain, and bounded as followeth to wit: (Beginning) at two black Oaks on the point of a ridge, thence South twenty seven degrees East fifty six poles to a black Oak and white Oak on a flat point on ^{the} top new river ridge, South seventy five degrees East fifty two poles to a pine and Spanish Oak Sapling on the top Laurel Creek ridge below the mouth of said Creek, North forty seven degrees East forty two poles to a Spanish Oak, North sixty two degrees East fourteen poles to two white Oaks, East eighty poles to a black Oak and dogwood on the top of a cliff of rocks, North thirty degrees East twenty poles to a Spanish Oak and Gum, North sixty eight poles to a white Oak and dogwood, North twenty eight degrees East forty poles to two white Oaks, North sixty five poles to two Maples North twenty eight degrees West sixty four poles to a Lynn Hickory and red bud Saplings on a draft of the foot of Gauley Mountain, thence South forty three degrees West two hundred and ninety three poles to the Beginning: with its appurtenances to have and to hold the said tract or parcel of Land with its appurtenances to the said Robert Young and his Heirs for ever. In Witness whereof the said Robert Brooke esquire Governor of the Commonwealth of Virginia hath hereunto set his hand and caused the Lesser seal of the the said Commonwealth to be affixed at Richmond on the nineteenth day of February in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and ninety six, and of the Commonwealth the twentieth

two hundred and twenty seven, there is granted by the said
 Commonwealth unto Robert Young a certain tract or parcels of
 Land, containing four hundred and fifty five Acres by Survey
 bearing date the twenty second day of November one thousand
 seven hundred and ninety three, lying and being in the County
 of Greenbrier, joining the Lands of Cockburn, James Jordan &
 Francis Mann deceased and a Survey made for said Young of three
 hundred Acres, and bounded as followeth to wit. Beginning at
 a Poplar Ash Lym and Sugar tree near Jordons Sugar Camp
 and running thence South sixty degrees East one hundred and
 sixty poles to a Chesnut and black Oak on Cockburns line, and with
 the same South twenty five degrees West one hundred and fifty
 poles to two black Oaks on the side of a Mountain, and with the same
 fifteen degrees East sixty poles to a Maple and red Oak, South
 forty degrees East twenty eight poles to a Chesnut Oak and White
 Oak, South eighty degrees East sixty poles to two red Oaks and Chesnut
 corner to the same and Jordan, and with Jordan, South twenty two
 degrees East forty six poles to Hickory red Oak and white Oak corner
 same and Mann, South sixty three degrees West two hundred and
 fifty poles to three Maples corner to Mann and leaving North
 thirty ^{three} degrees West one hundred and sixty four poles to a White Oak
 and two dogwoods on a point, North eighty four degrees West twenty eight
 poles to a red Oak and Chesnut Oak by a Hunting path, North forty
 degrees West forty poles to white Oaks and Black Oaks by said path,
 North sixty five degrees West forty poles to a red Oak ash and
 two Locusts, thence North thirty seven degrees East three hundred
 and ten poles to the Beginning, with its Appurtenances to have &
 to hold the said tract or parcel of Land with its Appurtenances to the
 said Robert Young and his Heirs forever. In Witness whereof the
 said Robert Brooke esquire hath hereunto set his hand & caused
 the Leger seal of the said Commonwealth to be affixed at Richmono
 on the nineteenth day of February in the year of our Lord one thousand
 seven hundred & ninety six of the Commonwealth the twentieth.
